



Mapping a Century: 100 Years of Geography at FCCU, Lahore (1924 - 2024)





Assalamu Alaikum and a very warm welcome to you all.

"It is both an honour and a privilege to stand before you today as we celebrate an outstanding milestone: 100 years of the Geography Department at Forman Christian College, a legacy that

began in 1924 with the visionary leadership of Prof. E. T. Dean. He not only founded this

department but also established Geography as an academic discipline in this institution, leaving a lasting imprint on the field in Pakistan.

Over the decades, the department has grown under the exceptional guidance of remarkable Leaders. **Prof. Earnst Noal Dalvi** advanced the department's academic rigor, nurturing students into critical thinkers and competent geographers over the years. Later, **Prof. Ashhad Ahmad** modernized the curriculum and introduced innovative teaching practices that made the discipline relevant to the evolving demands of the field.

From 2009 to 2023, I had the privilege of serving as Chair of this department. During my tenure, together with my team made significant strides in introducing technological advancements, expanding research opportunities, and fostering interdisciplinary collaboration. These efforts, along with those of my predecessors, have strengthened the department's reputation as a leading center for Geographic education in Pakistan.

An essential part of the department's legacy has been its emphasis on experiential learning. For decades, students have explored Pakistan's mountains, deserts, and coastal areas on field trips that have brought classroom concepts to life, providing invaluable insights into the country's diverse Physical and Human Geography. Today, the department is in the hands of Dr. Khadija Shakrullah, whose vision and leadership will take the department toward new heights.

The journey of our department is intertwined with the history of geography in Pakistan. Forman Christian College has played a pivotal role in training generations of geographers who have contributed to academia, geospatial planners, civil services, and many other sectors of Pakistan. From the study of traditional physical Geography to the introduction of human and regional studies, the department has continually evolved to meet the needs of the times.

Today, the Geography Department stands as a vibrant hub of learning and research. After that, **Prof. Dr. Safdar Ali Shirazi**, Ex-director Institute of Geography University of the Punjab Delivered the keynote speech. He provided a comprehensive introduction to the Evolution of Geography in the subcontinent and its growth in Pakistan, tracing its academic journey from the colonial period to modern times.

Assalamu Alaikum and Good Morning,

"Today we are ALL gathered here to celebrate 100 years of Geography in the subcontinent/South Asia at the Department of Geography, FCCU, Lahore. Therefore, the title of my talk today is **"Introduction and Evolution of the Subject of Geography in Subcontinent and Pakistan".** The teaching of modern geography started in the Subcontinent in the first half of the 20th Century when several colleges and universities established undergraduate departments of geography in various parts of this region. Further to this, the introduction and origin of geography as a subject can be traced back to the second half of the 19th Century when it was introduced as a subject in schools across the Subcontinent. However, in comparison with other emerging disciplines in the Subcontinent during those years, the full flagged undergraduate departments of geography compared to most other disciplines, were established rather late in the institutions of higher learning in the Subcontinent.

The possible reason for this dichotomy could be attributed to a popular perception among college and university authorities during that period to consider geography as purely a school subject. This ultimately was one of the reasons for their reluctance to consider the subject of geography for college-level teaching and to render its rightful place at the undergraduate level.

The study of geography was started at the Forman Christian College, Lahore in 1924, though it was introduced as a subject at school or higher secondary level in Lahore and other places earlier as one of the school subjects. It means that the teaching of geography at the undergraduate level in the college and university level has witnessed a span of 100 years now which deserves academic celebrations. Therefore, the year 2024 is to commemorate the introduction of geography as a college subject in the Subcontinent. Geography in Subcontinent has come a long way since the establishment of the first undergraduate department in 1924 at Forman Christian College, Lahore.

The history of the development of Geography as a science is an interesting study no doubt, but it is no less interesting for the students of Geography in this FCCU to know something about the history of College Geography in our Subcontinent as well as in Pakistan and to recall the names of those pioneers who are responsible for getting Geography to its present status in Subcontinent/South Asia and Pakistan. It was in the year 1924 when geography was introduced in Panjab University as a college subject as well as in the Subcontinent. It was mainly through the efforts of **Prof. E. T. Dean**, of the Forman Christian College. Therefore, Forman Christian College, Lahore was the first institute to introduce the teaching of Geography to Intermediate Classes in areas now in Pakistan as well as in the Subcontinent. In 1924, Forman Christian College admitted the first batch of nine students to the First Year Class with Geography as an elective subject and sent up this batch for the University Examination in 1926. The Government College, Lahore, admitted its first batch of B.A. students in Geography in 1936. The subject gained great popularity rapidly and the Department of Geography of the Government College attracted quite several students from several other local colleges, namely F. C. College, S. D. College, and Kinnaird College for Women. In the year 1938, given the increasing importance of the subject, the Forman Christian College authorities were persuaded by Mr. Dean to start their own classes in Geography for B.A. students. Forman Christian College sent up its first batch of about a dozen Geography students in 1939, for University Examination. Soon after this the Islamia College, Lahore, Kinnaird College for Women, Lahore, Emerson College, Multan, Government College, Ludhiana, Lahore College for Women, and Sikh National College, Lahore, almost simultaneously started B.A. classes in Geography.

Before 1947, eight colleges were teaching Geography up to B. A and twenty up to the Intermediate standard. Today my talk regarding the introduction and evolution of Geography as a subject would be incomplete without mentioning the recent developments and strides. I refer to the acknowledgment by the University, to consider Geography as a science subject for Intermediate Science and B.Sc. examinations and permission of the University for the introduction of Geography for M.A. teaching and the introduction of the Inter-Collegiate Honours teaching endeavours. As per available records, the first university to start a postgraduate department of geography was Aligarh Muslim University (1931), followed by Calcutta University (1941), Banaras Hindu University and Allahabad University (1946), Punjab University (1946) and Madras University (1948).

Development of Geography in Pakistan

At the time of Independence in 1947, geography held a prominent position in the educational arena, largely owing to the educational endeavors and efforts of the British Raj in the Subcontinent. Geography as a part of the school curriculum provides a study of physical features and phenomena, as well as acquaintance with the surroundings. Geography at that time was taught as an Elective subject in colleges. The Colleges were a few, rather handful in the beginning. Lahore had Five-Government College, Forman Christian College, Lahore College for Women, Islamia College, and Kinnaird College for Women till independence. In Multan, Emerson College was the third college providing Graduate level studies in Geography. At somewhat later in time but still before Independence Sadiq-Egerton College at Bahawalpur emerged as an institution offering Geography. Government College at Quetta affiliated with the University of the Punjab entered the arena in the early 1950's.

For Postgraduate studies, there was just one institution- the Punjab University, Department (now Institute) of Geography in Lahore. The eminent geographer from Aligarh Muslim University, Dr. Kazi Saeed-ud-Ahmad was its founder head. I have the honor to be its last Chairman and first Director as the PU, Department of Geography was elevated from the status of a Department to an Institute in 2022 during my tenure as its Chairman. The University of Sindh was established just in the year of Independence in Karachi in 1947. The University of Peshawar came in 1950, and the University of Karachi was established in 1952, whereby the University of Sindh was shifted to Hyderabad. All these developments in the field of education contributed to raising the status of Geography as a subject in the country.

Probably no subject in the field of higher education has undergone such a marked change during the past century and particularly during the past three decades, as Geography. For many years it was a school subject, and it was only 100 years ago when it entered as College and University. Geography has been recognized today as a science due to its systematic study of the Earth's physical features, climate, landscapes, and the interactions between humans and their environment. It employs scientific methods to analyses spatial patterns and processes, often integrating natural sciences with social sciences to understand complex relationships. Over time, its status has evolved, and it is now considered an interdisciplinary science that bridges the physical and cultural worlds.

Thus, the status of Geography in Pakistan continued at a harmonious stature, though research activity remained much on the basic levels. However, the future of the subject of Geography is bright with the introduction of quantitative techniques, geospatial tools, and techniques during the last 25 to 30 years and I foresee greater utility of the subject in national development and job opportunities for the students of Geography in Pakistan. Thank you ALL".

A lively and thought-provoking discussion on the past, present, and future of geography from both global and Pakistani perspectives. The panellists provided their insights on how geography as a discipline has evolved and what the future holds for this field.
